Canada has three levels of government: federal, provincial or territorial, and municipal government.

The municipal government receives its power from the provincial or territorial government and is governed by the Municipal Government Act that state the purposes of municipalities.

Municipal governments consist of a **council** that are made up of a **mayor** and **councillors**. The city or town council decides on by-laws that deal with issues that concern their community through committees that are made up of councillors. This can include public parks, libraries, social services, garbage removal, recycling, public transportation, local police and fire services.

This document provides details on the processes of municipal governments in centres across Alberta. Sources are linked throughout the document and further detail can be found on each municipality's website.

BANFF

Town Council

Banff Town Council consists of an elected mayor and six elected councillors

Town Council Meetings are open to the public and are held at Banff Town Hall. Members of the public can register to speak on a specific agenda item or book time to present on a topic as a delegation.

Public Hearings are opportunities for the public to speak to council on specific bylaws. Members of the public can register to speak at Public Hearing of Banff Town Council.

BROOKS

City Council

Brooks City Council consists of an elected Mayor and six elected Councillors.

City Council Meetings are held twice a month at <u>Brooks City Hall</u>, the agendas can be found <u>here</u>. Members of the public can <u>register</u> to make a presentation to Council as a delegation.

Committees

The City of Brooks has many <u>Boards</u>, <u>Committees and Commissions</u>. However, the City of Brooks has two main committees: <u>Council Committee</u> and the <u>Municipal Planning Commission</u>. Further information and agendas can be found <u>here</u>.

CALGARY

City Council

Calgary City Council consists of an elected <u>Mayor</u> and fourteen <u>Councillors</u>.

Council meetings consist of reviewing reports and approving or editing recommendations within them. These reports are provided in advance in the **Council meeting agenda**. Council meetings are usually held on Mondays and the public is open to attend any public Council meeting in person or watch remotely **online**. Members of the public can attend and speak to items during a Public Hearing which are held once a month. There are four Standing Policy Committees (SPCs) that report directly to Council. The reports are worked on by a Council committee before going to Council.

City Councillors and the public participate in over 60 boards, commissions, and committees that make reports and recommendations to City Council on a variety of topics. Public members for

EDMONTON

City Council

Edmonton City Council consists of an elected Mayor and twelve elected Councillors.

<u>City Council Meetings</u> are open to the public and are held at <u>Edmonton City Hall</u>. Edmonton City Council also holds <u>Public Hearings</u> where members of the public can <u>register</u> to speak on specific agenda items.

Committees

Edmonton has nine <u>committees</u> comprised of members of City Council. Each committee focuses on different areas within the City of Edmonton. Topics relevant within each committee are discussed and decided at committee level prior to going to City Council for approval. Fort McMurray falls within the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (RMWB). RMWB Council consists of an elected <u>Mayor</u> and ten elected <u>Councillors</u>.

Council meetings are held twice a month and are open to the public, agendas and minutes can be found <u>here</u>.

City Council

Lethbridge City Council consists of an elected <u>Mayor</u> and eight elected <u>Councillors</u>. Council meetings are held biweekly and are open to the public, Council meetings consist of listening to presentations, asking questions, reviewing reports or written submissions, and considering recommendations written within them. Council meeting agenda and minutes can be found <u>here</u>.

Council members are appointed to committees, and the City regularly recruits volunteers from the community to serve on them, as well.

LLOYDMINSTER

City Council

Lloydminster City Council consists of an elected Mayor and six Councillors. City Council meetings are held twice a month and are open to the public to attend and are live-streamed via **YouTube**. Lloydminster City Council meeting **schedule** is posted online and City Council **agendas and meeting minutes** are available to access online.

The public is open to speak at a Council meeting or Governance and Priorities Committee (GPC) meeting. More information on how to submit a request to present at a public meeting can be found <u>here</u>.



MEDICINE HAT

City Council

<u>Medicine Hat City Council</u> consists of a Mayor and eight Councillors, elected for a term of four years. The public can attend City Council meetings and can access to meeting <u>minutes and</u> <u>agendas</u> and <u>meeting videos</u>.
