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## LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

In the spirit of reconciliation, the Alberta Association of Immigrant Serving Agencies (AAISA) acknowledges the land known as Moh'kinstsis (Calgary) which is Blackfoot for the joining of two rivers – the Elbow and Bow. AAISA recognizes we are situated upon the traditional territories of the Blackfoot Confederacy (Siksika, Kainai, Piikani), the Tsuut'ina, the Îyâxe Nakoda Nations, the Métis Districts (5 and 6), and the Treaty 7 region of Southern Alberta. AAISA serves members across the province of Alberta which are comprised of Treaty 6, Treaty 7, and Treaty 8 territories, the traditional lands of First Nations and Métis peoples. We acknowledge all 21 Metis Districts, and the lands which comprise Alberta and with which indigenous peoples have lived and stewarded since time immemorial. We acknowledge the many First Nations, Métis and Inuit who have lived in and cared for these lands for generations. We are grateful for the traditional Knowledge Keepers and Elders who are still with us today and those who have gone before us. We make this acknowledgement as an act of reconciliation and gratitude to those whose territory we reside on or



are visiting. As members of the settlement and integration sector, it is of the utmost importance we can acknowledge these lands in recognition of Canada's colonial history, and the deep impact settlement has had and continues to have, on Indigenous peoples here and across the world. We hope this acknowledgment can inform all facets of our work, in the spirit of friendship and joint stewardships with indigenous communities, particularly under the calls to action outlined by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada.

## WELCOME TO WINTER

Welcome to Calgary Winter! Whether this is your first winter in Calgary or your tenth, AAISA invites you to use this handbook to better prepare yourself for the winter season. Through this handbook, AAISA hopes to present the winter resources and information available within Calgary in an accessible way. You will find a few resources that AAISA has collated regarding warmth, safety, and community and to support the work of service agencies as they help prepare their clients for the season. This handbook will be frequently updated to ensure that the resources listed are accurate! As of December 2023, the information provided is accurate and any mentioned resources are accessible and available for your use!

#### What is Calgary winter like?

Winter months generally occur during December, January, and February (Arrive, 2020). Winter can often begin in November and temperatures may remain chilly through late March or early April (Weather Spark, n.d.). January is the coldest month of the year in Calgary, averaging between -11°C and -1°C (Weather Spark, n.d.). With a prairie-steppe type climate, winters include high sunshine hours and a windy climate (Living in Canada, n.d.). Overall, Alberta is the sunniest province in Canada with 312 days of sun per year (Travel Alberta Canada, n.d.).

#### Why is important to prepare for Calgary winter as a newcomer?

Both individual attributes and external factors can affect an individual's degree to which they integrate into Canadian society (Canadian Council for Refugees, 1998). Canadian weather can be an external factor which affects newcomer settlement. Adjusting to Canada's seasons can be difficult without community support and ample information. Misconceptions regarding the winter season can create even harder adjustments, therefore this handbook attempts to collate knowledge to combat those barriers and have newcomers feeling more comfortable with the Calgary winter.

### **STAYING SAFE**

#### Transportation

Whether you are using public transportation or driving your own personal vehicle, road safety information is vital to know for Calgarian winter.

<u>The Calgary Transit</u> is the public transportation service in Calgary. They frequently announce bus schedule changes, fare information, and rider tools as their service delivery evolves from season to season.
