




PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Research & Policy

AAISA's Research and Policy department empowers member agencies and other relevant stakeholders through conducting and disseminating member-informed research, and by staying on pulse of current and emerging trends and challenges facing the immigrant-serving sector of Alberta.

4 Policy Briefings

These policy briefings focused on a variety of emergent issues and developments that affect newcomers to Alberta including an exploration of the New Restrictions to the Temporary Foreign Workers Program; an Evaluation of the SOGIE Refugee Claim and Hearing Process; an Evaluation of the Fair and Family-Friendly Workplace Act; and exploration of the Changes to the Citizenship Act and Implications for SPOs in Alberta.

Data Sharing Project

Over 2017/18, an environmental scan assessing the current best practices of data management in Alberta was conducted, and AAISA is eager to advance this project into a strategy and recommendations to improve on identified barriers and challenges across the province.

Alberta Settlement & Integration Sector Survey

In January 2018, AAISA disseminated the inaugural Alberta Settlement and Integration Sector Survey to better understand sector priorities. AAISA looks forward to sharing the results of this survey in a forthcoming report as a conduit to providing organizations across Alberta with the tools to offer high-quality, innovative, and adaptable programs and services to newcomers.

Participation in 4 Research Networks

AAISA is proud to participate in the Child and Youth Refugee Research Coalition (CYRCC) in the Broader Economic, Social and Political Factors research cluster. CYRCC seeks to connect scholars, community partners, and government agencies to promote the successful integration of child and youth refugees in Canada through meaningful policy.

STRATEGIC ENGAGEMENT

The Strategic Engagement team at AAISA is dedicated to facilitating and convening the Alberta settlement and integration sector. Through a multiplicity of activities and initiatives, AAISA provides space for invaluable idea-sharing designed to identify the emergent priorities, and opportunities for Alberta.

30 Site Visits

Through these visits, discussions emerged between AAISA staff and executive leadership of member organizations on surfacing needs, trends, and opportunities, while also highlighting the many achievements unique to each organization. These meetings also provided an invaluable opportunity for AAISA to receive feedback on current engagement work and flesh-out strategies to better advocate for and support members across the province.

Caucuses

The Settlement Sector Caucuses assembles member agencies in the large urban centres to collaboratively discuss systems-level challenges, gaps, and opportunities through a solutions focused lens. These led to a diverse array of exciting projects that have uniquely addressed relevant needs that often extended beyond the Caucuses.

Resettlement Assistance Program Dashboard

The Resettlement Assistance Program is offered by six Alberta organizations to provide resettlement services and resources for government assisted refugees as they arrive in Canada. AAISA supports these organizations through a monthly survey, quarterly teleconferences, and dashboards that serve to share information, best practices, and seek solutions to various challenges.

STRATEGIC ENGAGEMENT

Survivors of Daesh Response Committee

To address the challenges inherent to serving the complex needs of this population, AAISA launched the Calgary Survivors of Daesh Response Committee in March 2018. Through this initiative, relevant stakeholders provide collective supports to better serve this vulnerable population.

Small Centre Engagement

Small centres across the province come together quarterly to share knowledge, and build a collective voice through a lens that highlights the strengths and ingenuity of the small centres in Alberta's settlement sector.

The Small Centres also completed an annual needs assessment in January 2018. AAISA looks forward to encompassing this assessment into an engagement strategy and a Toolkit to create an interactive and collaborative platform.

Helping Immigrants Succeed

Revitalized in February 2018, the Helping Immigrants Succeed initiative convenes three working groups in Language, Social Connections, and Employment. These groups are comprised of front-line managers across the province, and meet quarterly to collaboratively discuss relevant news, specific projects, and strategies for solving provincial challenges.

EVENTS

Alberta Integration Summit

300 Participants

AAISA hosted the First Annual Alberta Integration Summit in fall 2017. This event convened funders, members, and relevant stakeholders to facilitate meaningful conversation around resettlement, settlement, and integration. Over the course of three days, the summit included workshops, discussions, and presentations from various community partners and settlement specific professionals that led to meaningful insights summarized in the report, **2017 Alberta Integration Summit: Summary, Key Recommendations, and Action Plan.**

AAISA's participation and facilitation of a multitude of workshops, consultations, and conferences acts as a key element in empowering productive engagement in Alberta. These invaluable opportunities allowed for relationship-building, information sharing, and priority setting.

National Metropolis Conference

AAISA was presented with a valuable opportunity to volunteer and present during this national conference. From facilitating workshops, coordinating site visits, and running the social media, staff connected with diverse professionals across Canada during this three-day event.

National Small Centres Conference

AAISA proudly participated in the National Small Centres Settlement & Integration Conference hosted by Central Alberta Refugee Effort (C.A.R.E.) in Red Deer. Through this conference, delegates from across Canada's small centres gathered to discuss priorities and best practices unique to smaller urban and rural centres across the country. The lively discourse over three days led to many invaluable insights to inform and contextualize strategies going forward.

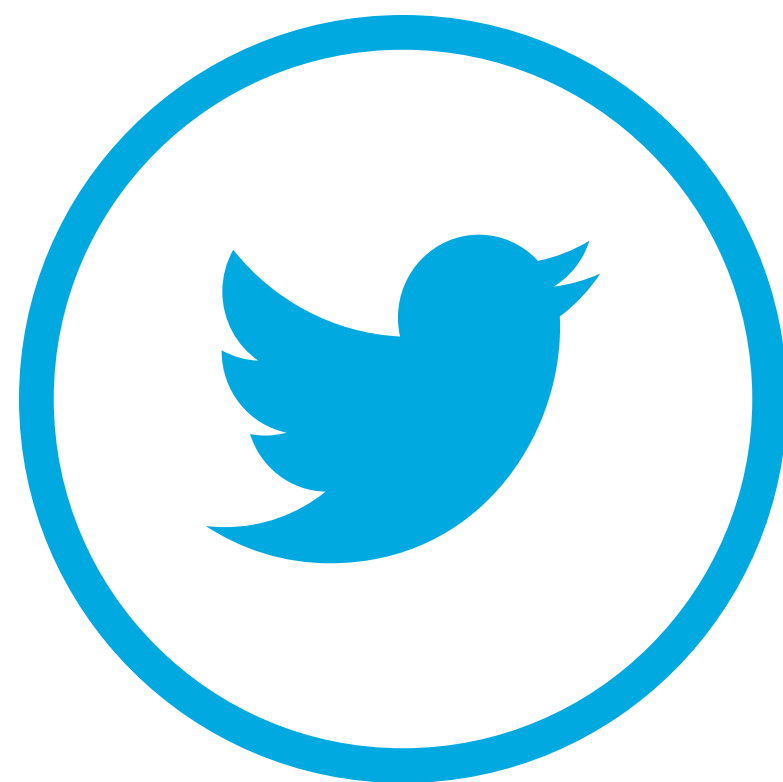
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
